(2025, Brazil / France / Germany / Netherlands, 158') Director: Kleber Mendonça Filho

In 1977, during Brazil's dictatorship, a 40-year-old man with a mysterious past and vague intentions arrives in the city of Recife, seemingly under threat. His arrival sets off the plot of a thrilling political thriller with which the creator of amazing films such as "Aquarius" and "Bacurau" makes a brilliant appeal to pure and satisfying cinema, made for movie theaters and big screens. Kleber Mendonça Filho exercises commendable control over his narrative, incorporating different cinematic genres and references into a compact whole and, underneath the suspense and social commentary, he subtly leads his film

towards something broader: a declaration of faith in the power of cinema to restore truth, keep memory alive, and become an indelible experience which, in the same way that it creates memories, also knows how to preserve them indefinitely. Winner of Best Director and Best Actor awards (for the exceptional Wagner Moura) at this year's Cannes Film Festival and Brazil's official submission to the upcoming Oscars, where it is expected to compete for more than one golden statuette.

(2025, Portugal / Brazil / France / Romania, 217') I.C. Director: Pedro Pinho

A Portuguese environmentalist travels to Guinea-Bissau to study the impact of a major road construction project on the region. There he meets a man and a woman, forming a tense love triangle through which he realizes the unequal dynamic between the locals and the white population, as well as his own inability to understand and integrate into the unfamiliar world around him. At the same time, he tries to unravel the mystery of his predecessor's disappearance. Demonstrating great boldness and confidence in his uncompromising and grandiose artistic vision, the director makes use of naturalism and amateur actors, blurring the lines between reality and fantasy in the guilty world of non-governmental organizations and disguised modern colonialism. A voyeuristic, sensually charged look at a personal odyssey that raises fascinating questions about identity and morality under the trope of the 'white savior'. An epic journey and a true cinematic revelation that places Pedro Pinho among the most important contemporary filmmakers.




19:30 ULTRAS

(2025, Sweden / Denmark / Finland, 89') D.C.

Director: Ragnhild Ekner

Filmed in eight different countries, this multifaceted documentary travels across the globe to capture from the inside the stories of fanatical soccer fans, known as ultras, shedding light on and examining the ardent supporter phenomenon in its entirety. Stories from the stands, with social, political, and unexpectedly poetic content, where the protagonists remain anonymous and the director (herself an organized fan) inserts impressive panoramas from the time of the matches. In stadiums where collective spirit, however colorful, is expressed through venue rituals, where excessive love for the team overflows into choreographed passions and chants that paint the largest, most intense and more influential subculture humanity has ever known.





21:30 IT'S NEVER OVER, JEFF BUCKLEY (2025, USA, 107')

Director: Amy Berg

Amy Berg answers one of the greatest enigmas in musical history. Where would Jeff Buckley reach if his life thread lasted until he met his rock destiny and it wasn't cut so soon, in May 1997, on the Wolf River? The Oscar-nominated director uses interviews from his family and rare archival material from the first steps to the abrupt end of his career, to deliver a documentary baptized in his angelic voice and magnetic image. A moving portrait of one of the brightest and most influential rock stars of the 90s, which before reaching its zenith, with the legendary "Grace", exploded as a supernova and since then lights up the musical world

19:00 ROOFMAN (2025, USA, 126')

Director: Derek Cianfrance

The almost unbelievable but completely true story of a former soldier who, in the late 1990s, robbed dozens of McDonald's restaurants across America, ended up in prison, escaped, then found refuge in a toy store, where he met the love of his life, a single mother of two children, despite the fact that he remained constantly invisible to the police. Openly embracing the romantic comedy genre in his most mainstream effort to date, Derek Cianfrance ('Blue Valentine') creates a bittersweet and disarming film based on real events, that perfectly balances authentic independent American cinema with familiar Hollywood conventions, and is elevated by the exceptional chemistry between its two leads, Channing Tatum and Kirsten Dunst.

22:00 BUGONIA

(2025, Ireland / South Korea / USA, 117')

Director: Yorgos Lanthimos

One of Yorgos Lanthimos' most enjoyable and skillfully directed films, with a wonderful Emma Stone in the lead role, "Bugonia" is inspired by the contemporary numbness of an entire planet manipulated by fake news, endless eschatology, and a general paranoia further exacerbated by COVID. Successfully balancing comedy and drama, the film initially recounts the kidnapping and hostage-taking of a managing director of a powerful pharmaceutical company by two men who have fed their minds with so many conspiracy theories that they are convinced the cold and ruthless CEO is in fact an alien entity who has come to our planet to insidiously lead it to its destruction. Starting off deliriously with a plot that questions the dangers of misinterpreting the truth in a world which insists on constantly distorting it, Lanthimos rolls his story towards a delirious third part that attempts to answer with sardonic humor the same burning question that has been posed so frequently in cinema: Does humanity really deserve to be saved, and allowed to perpetuate itself, after the sins and wrongdoing it has serially committed?

20:00 MY FATHER'S SHADOW (2025, Nigeria / Ireland / UK, 94') I.C.

Director: Akinola Davies

A father away from his family for long, takes his two children and travels from the village to the bustling Lagos, where he will claim a salary he is owed. As the three of them explore a restless, filled with contradictions metropolis, political tensions simmer in the background, leading to the turbulent elections and the military coup of 1993 in Nigeria. The long-awaited film debut of the multifaceted Akinola Davis combines the tenderness of a child's gaze with the harshness of urban everyday life and infuses a delightful autobiographical coming-of-age story (that unfolds in a single day) with a strikingly modern neorealism. The film is the result of a contemporary aesthetic carved out in new media and an obvious lyrical sensibility. Its coming heralds the arrival of an important director, a view reinforced by the special mention it received in the Caméra d'Or competition at the Cannes Film Festival.

22:00 CHRISTY (2025, Ireland / UK, 94')

Director: Brendan Cantii

Recently, any film coming to us from Irish cinema, whether it's "The Quiet Girl" or "Small Things Like These," is made with sincerity and genuine humanity. It is why it strikes a chord with the audience. "Christy" is made of the same materials, featuring a 17-year-old orphan with a violent past who is forced to move out of the foster home he has been living. Until his social reintegration is decided, he is temporarily housed with his older brother and his wife in Cork. However, his surroundings tempt him to return to a life of crime, while his brother struggles to keep him on the straight and narrow. What looks like a gloomy drama on paper translates into a film made to warm the heart and reward the audience with plenty of smiles. 
20:00 THE TALE OF SILYAN / Силјан (2025, North Macedonia, 80') **D.C.**

Director: Tamara Kotevska

In 2019. Tamara Kotevska co-directed "Honevland". a phenomenal documentary that won international acclaim and earned two Oscar nominations (Best Documentary and Best International Feature Film) - the first time in the history of the Academy that a documentary had achieved such a feat. Six years later. Kotevska delivers another gem. Starting from a 17th-century folk tale about a father's curse that transforms his son into a stork and banishes him from the world of humans, the film unexpectedly identifies the fairy tale with the current reality of a sixty-year-old farmer who sees his work perishing and his family members becoming economic migrants. However. a little hope magically appears in his life in the form of an injured stork that the man finds and nurses back to health. The affectionate relationship he develops with the wounded bird becomes a consolation in his loneliness and proof of love as the only connecting link between all creatures in this harsh world. Spreading her directorial wings, Kotevska elevates her documentary to the realm of pure poetry. North Macedonia's official submission for the upcoming Oscars.

By 2075 kids grow up with nanny-robots and see their parents through holograms. One of those kids is Iris and one day she will meet Arco, a boy from the future that fell from the sky wearing a rainbow-colored cape. Their curiosity for the environment becomes the basis for a strong friendship, which leads Iris to help Arco in any way possible to return home. The most sensitive undertones of "E.T." and "The Iron Giant" meet the cosmic disco origins of newcomer Bienvenu who, assisted by Natalie Portman in the production, builds a visually stunning animation for everyone. "Arco" comes as an ecological warning, a masterwork of animation and above all a majestic story on companionship full of emotional power.

21:45 NOUVELLE VAGUE (2025, France / USA, 106')

Director: Richard Linklater

In the definitively most feel-good movie of the year, Lin-klater unravels humorously and in an irresistibly nostalgic mood the adventurous creation of "Breathless" that came thunderously in 1960 introducing the uncompromising and subversive talent of Jean-Luc Godard. With a retro black-and-white photography that exudes the atmosphere of 1960s French cinema and an enviable cast of mostly first-time actors who brilliantly embody (in impressive physical resemblance) all the fiery personalities

of the New Wave, the acclaimed American director of "Before Sunrise" delivers the most unexpected creation of his prolific career in... French. A systematically enjoyable film that not only vividly brings to life the behind-the-scenes story of a film that would forever mark the history of cinema, but also perfectly captures the artistic ferment and revolutionary spirit of an entire era.

00:00 BLUE FILM (2025, USA, 82')

Director: Elliot Tuttle

The riskiest, more controversial queer film of the year, touches upon issues and tampers with taboos that promise, at least for some in the audience, to bring inconvenience. Still, however, behind the erotically tempting title one may see a fearless, introspective debut that walks through some questionable moral territory of the human nature while attempting to investigate faces of desire and sexuality hard to analyze. Its protagonist is an arrogant sex worker and camboy in contemporary LA, who accepts the preposterous suggestion of a mysterious, masked stranger, to spend the night with him for 50 thousand dollars. When he meets him, and gradually finds out how this man is related to him, the night takes a new turn. Instead of a game of lust and power, the film becomes a confessional confrontation between two deeply problematic men who take their masks off so as to disclose their true, vulnerable faces. The two performances are truly gutsy, but the real find is young Kieron Moore.

22:00 RESURRECTION / 狂野时代 (2025, China / France / USA, 160')

Director: Bi Gan

In an unspecified future obstructing dreaming becomes the secret of longevity. Still, a handful of rebels tenaciously deny to abandon dreaming choosing thus a short but exciting life in exchange of their dreams that, however, disrupts History. Starting from a symbolic science fiction idea, the visionary Chinese director of the amazing "Long Day's Journey Into Night" invites us to leave our expectations outside the theater and indulge in a feverish dream-retrospective of cinema history, through five episodes that ingeniously jump from era to era and from one genre to another. From expressionist horror to the monochrome world of spy noir, and from a snowy Buddhist parable to the ecstatically beautiful vampire romance, "Resurrection" aspires to encompass an entire century of cinema and does so with unparalleled skill, reminding us that art can still test its limits. The landscape is inhospitable and harshly male-dominated, but the courageous members of the community respond with titillating wit and courage, until rumors of a contagious deadly virus spread fear and violence throughout the region. It is incredible that this spectacular, passionate, and magnanimous film is a directorial debut. And yet, the young director manages to combine moving allegory with proud melodrama in a vivid and feverish combination that deservedly won the Grand Prix at the Cannes Film Festival's 'Un Certain Regard' and constitutes Chile's official submission for the 2026 Oscars.

22:00 REBUILDING (2025, USA, 95')

Director: Max Walker-Silverman

Josh O'Connor is utterly disarming in the role of a broken young farmer who tries to stand tall and claim a better life in front of his little daughter's sad eves. When a fire destroys large tracts of land in rural Colorado, including his own farm, the hero has no choice but to start from scratch. To do so, he rallies around him the poor families who have also been devastated by the fires in the area. And like some other, smaller but fairer version of the American dream, they will all try together to lay the foundations for a better future. In adverse and difficult times, such as ours, films like the elegiac and sweet "Rebuilding" feel comforting and unpretentious in their attempt to whisper the need for humanity, community and solidarity against the great suffering of our world. All we need to do is lean in affectionately and listen to the valuable things they have to say.

How can one remain unmoved by the desperate pleas for help from a six-year-old girl from Palestine, trapped in a car that has just been riddled with Israeli bullets, a girl hidden all alone among the dead bodies of her murdered relatives as danger looms? And how can we not sympathize with the anguish of this little child, but also with the desperate efforts of a handful of volunteers who are trying to rescue her as quickly as possible? The story is true. And with a powerful combination of fiction and documentary, based on audio recordings of the real event, Ben Hania dramatizes the chronicle of a tragedy without sentimentality, in a film as painful as it is urgent, which has already been selected as Tunisia's official entry for the upcoming Oscars. It won the Grand Jury Prize at the Venice Film Festival (many felt it should have won the Golden Lion), and has the support of big names like Brad Pitt, Joaquin Phoenix, Alfonso Cuarón, Jonathan Glazer, and is currently the most talked-about film of 2025.



Relentless in its revelations, sad in its observations, shockingly urgent and designed to cause justified anxiety in anyone who watches it, the film lists all the misguided. hypocritical strategies employed by (not only) the Bush administration in order to initially support, cover up and then sell hot air to the countless scientific and ecological voices that, since the late 1970s, have called for immediate action on the catastrophic consequences of global warming. Using exclusively archive footage, valuable interviews, and references to leaked classified documents, this valuable investigative documentary no longer sounds the alarm, but rather launches an anathema against all human foolishness, political hypocrisy and criminal negligence that have led this planet and all of us to count down toward an inevitable and complete environmental catastrophe that could have been prevented.

19:30 MOTHER'S BABY / MUTTERGLÜCK (2025, Austria / Switzerland / Germany, 107')

Director: Johanna Moder

A renowned 40-year-old conductor of a large orchestra puts temporarily her career on hold and prepares finally to become a mother. Soon, however, she thinks that something very wrong occurred during her delivery and suspects that the baby she is carrying in her arms is not hers, but perhaps the product of some dark genetic conspiracy. The anxieties of motherhood and the way in which a child radically changes the way we perceive the world, are translated into a perversely entertaining combination of psychological thriller, paranoid fantasy and black comedy, which the Austrian director delivers with exact doses of mystery, ambiguity and grotesque humor, never forgetting to keep the audience on the edge of their seat.



Director: Harris Dickinson

We met Harris Dickinson as one of the bravest, most exciting actors of his generation in parts like the ones in "Beach Rats", "Babygirl" and the "Triangle of Sadness". Time for him to be introduced as a talented director thanks to this commendable social drama, inspired by the finest tradition of British realist cinema, strongly reminiscent of Mike Leigh's astonishing "Naked". It narrates the spasmodic journey of an impulsive and transgressive young man who tries to survive on the streets of London in spite of his self-destructive nature. Without a hint of moralizing or idealizing, filming with tension and humanity, co-starring Dickinson composes a hard-hitting ballad of lost, ever-wandering souls for whom there seems to be no place in this world. Exceptional in the starring role, Frank Dillane carries with dignity in his shoulders the entire film.

19:00 THE ICE TOWER / LE TOUR DE GLACE (2025, France / Germany, 118')

Director: Lucile Hadžihalilović

A 16-year-old orphan girl runs away from the foster family she lives with, somewhere in the French countryside in the 1970s, and ends up in the city. She has no money, so she sneaks in and finds refuge behind the scenes of a film shoot of 'The Snow Queen,' which happens to be a favorite fairy tale of hers. She sleeps there and soon becomes an extra in the film and then the protégée of the extremely moody and acclaimed leading actress (Marion Cotillard), who hides many more secrets than her seductive face lets on. Returning once again to the motif of the girl in danger, which she has explored in her previous films, the creator of the mystical 'Innocence' and 'Evolution' places a story of almost vampiric seduction between fantasy and reality, sprinkling it with a charmingly otherworldly atmosphere, giving it dreamlike overtones and eliciting an imposing performance from Marion Cotillard.

21:30 AFTER THE HUNT (2025, Italy / USA, 139')

Director: Luca Guadagnino

Alma is a professor at Yale University. She teaches philosophy, has had her eye on the position of dean for some time, is a workaholic, and lives a very comfortable life. When a female student accuses a friend and colleague at the university of rape, her orderly life is shaken, threatening to unearth a painful secret from her past. At once thrilling mystery and sharp moral parable, the film touches on a host of burning contemporary issues - from cancel culture and modern witch hunts to the veiled hypocrisy of an entire society towards issues of class, race, privilege. and sexuality. Luca Guadagnino's psychological thriller invites us to project our own beliefs onto what we see and guess ourselves where the truth lies and where lies prevail. Julia Roberts enjoys one of the strongest parts of her career, although the one who really steals the show is Michael Stuhlbarg (the father in "Call Me by Your Name") playing her witty, stoic husband.

It's a psychological drama, it's a latent thriller, it's a queer romance. And it's not at all what it seems. 



Starting from a 17th-century folk tale about a father's curse that transforms his son into a stork and banishes him from the world of humans, the film unexpectedly identifies the fairy tale with the current reality of a sixty-year-old farmer who sees his work perishing and his family members becoming economic migrants. 
