Of analogous structure and almost as worthy as "Citizen Kane" in baroque grandeur, "Mr Arcadin" leads the audience through an amazing narrative labyrinth about the case of a notorious tycoon with a dark past and the opportunist who undertakes the task of investigating his enigmatic life, though he ends up putting his own life in danger. Having endured the devastating intervention of producers, and having been released throughout the years in different versions, a digitally restored copy of the version that is considered closest to the director's original vision will be screened.

21:45 GREAT FREEDOM / GROSSE FREIHEIT (2021, Austria / Germany, 116') I.C. (2021)

Director: Sebastian Meise

In post-war Germany and while homosexuality is punished as a criminal offense, a man is sent to prison repeatedly because of his sexual preferences. As the film spans twenty years of his life, his imprisonment becomes an ongoing struggle for survival and for the preservation of his rights regarding what he defines as desire and independence. A courageous drama and simultaneously an unconventional love story, with the great performance of the up-andcoming Franz Rogowski ("Transit"), this bold film won the Un Certain Regard Jury Prize award at this year's Cannes Film Festival.

In this film he chronicles the end of a marriage in the midst of a divided Berlin, camouflaging a family drama in an almost surreal horror film getting from Isabelle Adjani one of the most breathtaking female performances we have seen, which rightfully earned her the Best Actress award at the Cannes Film Festival.

In a career full of misfortune, punishment, tough pleas, and commercial fiascos, "The Tragedy of Othello: The Moor of Venice" and the turbulent filming that lasted four years are indicative of the director's obstinate willingness to go to the edge of the world to achieve his vision. The genius of Welles behind the camera brings one of the Bard's darkest plays to life, in a stunning black and white composition as this admirable cinematic craftsmanship full of heart, ardour and blood, to this day, constitutes the sacred manual of how to make films and how to watch them. In prison he is questioned for weeks by a group of three doctors who try to get him to revisit the past, unable to understand his murderous instincts. Based on a true story, Vincent Le Port's debut outlines, with clinical precision, the portrait of a manic killer, masterfully maintains a balance between vulnerability and absolute chilling elements and studies how religious devotion, patriarchy and repressed sexuality become entangled in the root of all Evil.

Nowadays, it plays a determining role in Ethiopia's economy as it is the country's main export. Through a personal story, a hypnotic documentary made of soundscapes and textures shaped by sunlight, document's Khat's footprint on a nation surrendered to its euphoric hallucinations.




20:00 SUMMER OF SOUL (...OR, WHEN THE **REVOLUTION COULD NOT BE TELEVISED)**



20:00 LITTLE GIRL / PETITE FILLE (2020, France, 85')

Seven-year old Sasha was born in the body of a boy, but already at the age of three she knows she is a girl. The scholar of the queer experience, Sébastien Lifshitz, follows her along with her and her family, insightfully capturing the challenges they face, moments of joy but also the disturbing reaction of a society which remains conservative. A deeply touching and authentically caring cinematic portrait exuding love, teaching compassion and empathy while at the same time serving as a real example of how family acceptance of all trans kids should look like.

22:00 PETITE MAMAN (2021, France, 72')

Having recently lost her grandmother, and with her own mother absent, 8-year old Nelly explores the woods and becomes friends with a girl of the same age who instantly seems unusually familiar to her. Two years after the feminist triumph of "Portrait of a Lady on Fire", Céline Sciamma mirrors the child's gaze through ethereal magical realism which echoes the paradoxical nature of Charlie Kaufman. A tender film acting as shelter for all children who have long since crossed the threshold of adulthood.

20:00 SEE YOU THEN (2021, USA, 75')

Two exes meet after thirteen years. One is married with children, the other is now a trans woman. They spend a whole night together and the more the intimacy between them is rekindled the closer they get to the memory of the traumatic event that defined their relationship. Disarmingly minimalist and directed with simplicity so as to focus only on what is necessary. The film, by transgender Mari Walker, is a calm and earnest outlook on the road to transition, but also on all the big and small things left behind, temporarily putting our lives on hold. RETROSPECTIVE: THIS IS ORSON WELLES 22:00 THE STRANGER

An example of the inconceivably artistic greatness of its director, "The Stranger" remains forgotten at the bottom of a superb filmography, but continues to be counted amongst some of the greatest noirs ever made. From every aspect, the most commercially successful film of the director's early period is a post-expressionistic classic. impressive because of the ingenuous way it was filmed, foreshadowing the aesthetics of "The Third Man"




20:00 CITIZEN KANE

19:30 ZERO FUCKS GIVEN / RIEN À FOUTRE (2021, Belaium / France, 110')

Directors: Emmanuel Marre, Julie Lecoustre

A young flight attendant travels around Europe and in between flights indulges in cheap alcohol and Tinder, living in a never-ending loop of bad techno music and even worse dates. But when she is unexpectedly fired, she will be forced to return to her family and deal with loose ends from the past. The Palme d'Or winning Adèle Exarchopoulos unequivocally steals the spotlight from anyone daring to share a scene with her, in a drama about a dazed generation looking for an emergency exit.


22:30 THE WORST PERSON IN THE WORLD / VERDENS VERSTE MENNESKE

Cannes Award winner Karim Aïnouz visits his father's country for the first time, looking for traces of his family's recent past. The viewer becomes beguiled with the Algerian history and its hinterland, becoming a participant in an elegy about the end of colonialism. Influenced by Godard's later films and with a unique sense for the digital mediums employed, Aïnouz offers up nothing less than a visual existentialist poem.



21:45 OLEANDERS (2021, Greece, 67') Director: Paola Revenioti Paola Revenioti, Betty Vakalidou and Eva Koumarianou, three transgender women who have known each other for over forty years, take a night stroll in Athens to revisit the streets where they started as sex workers at a young age, the places where they enjoyed life, where they were loved and the places where they struggled, lived and put up heroic fights.

In search of funding for her research, a career-driven archaeologist is willing to become a guinea pig for a high tech company manufacturing ideal lovers. However, the alluring android matched to her, proves to be more human than expected from a comedy on the verge of being a science fiction film. And so an impressive cast & crew (among which the director of "Unorthodox" Maria Schrader and a doll of a man - literally and metaphorically - Dan Stevens of "Downton Abbey") enter the arena of modern relationships, contemplating ideas such as the human condition and (unfulfilled) desires. Maren Eggert was awarded the Silver Berlin Bear.

22:15 HIT THE ROAD / JADDEH KHAKI (2021, Iran, 93') I.C. (2)

Director: Panah Panahi

The film begins in the middle of a road trip of unknown destination and origin. A family of four is secretly headed to the West. No one knows, nor should they, where they are going. Especially the six-year-old son (make note of the name Rayan Sarlak). A dilapidated SUV that crosses the lace-like Persian mountains, becomes the ideal vehicle for a moving and pithy debut. Exemplary abstract, Jafar Panahi's son watches silent desires as they transform into blasting music and go on to escape through the open car windows on their way to encounter notions such as family and selfless love.



19:45 THE FIRST DEATH OF JOANA / A PRIMEIRA MORTE DE JOANA

(2021, Brazil, 94') I.C. (2)

Director: Christiane Oliveira

South Brazil in the summer. Thirteen-year-old Joana bids a beloved relative farewell. Her first experience of sadness is accompanied by an unanswered enigma: is it true that "aunt Rosa" died without ever having been with a man? Along with her best friend, Joana embarks on an investigation into Rosa's past, realising that, like her, all the women in her family harbour a secret. A brilliant coming-of-age film, which touches on various aspects of the psychological makeup of teenagers through the life and secrets of others, through loss and friendship, exalting sexuality which is always unexpectedly awakened.

22:15 MOMENTS LIKE THIS NEVER LAST (2020, USA / Canada, 96') D.C. (2)

Director: Cheryl Dunn

He turned his back to a privileged family, wandered through the bad parts of New York, consumed as many drugs and alcohol as a body can take and veered headfirst to his untimely demise. In the meantime, however, Dash Snow went down in history in the graffiti movement, his legendary Polaroids depicted the world of the damned and he created a complete version of art which mirrored the counterculture of the 90s and his generation. 18:30 MACBETH

(1948, USA, 107')

Director: Orson Welles

Orson Welles' first undertaking of a William Shakespeare play was filmed in only 23 days, had little to no budget and would go on to signal the director's definite departure from Hollywood's gold-bearing resources. 



In the meantime, however, Dash Snow went down in history in the graffiti movement, his legendary Polaroids depicted the world of the damned and he created a complete version of art which mirrored the counterculture of the 90s and his generation. Director: Hogir Hirori

At the most dangerous military camp in the Middle East, a mobile phone and a gun are all that Mahmud and his team have as they endanger their lives daily in an effort to save women being held by ISIS as "Sabaya" (sex slaves). With a burga (literally) over the camera and with the sound of whizzing bullets around them, the camera bravely follows along on night missions and extreme pursuits in a thriller of a documentary which won a Directing Award thanks to its shocking approach and may well be up for a nomination in the coming Oscars.

RETROSPECTIVE: THIS IS ORSON WELLES 21:30 F FOR FAKE

(1973, France / Iran / West Germany, 89') (R) **Director:** Orson Welles

Orson Welles becomes a charlatan magician and a phony auter befitting his critics view of him. An ordinary thirtysomething man faces loss, unemployment, fatherhood, polite neighbours who complain about his restless dog and the impending collision of a meteorite with Earth, though not necessarily in that order. Guidelines for the audience according to the health protocols in force



ATTENDANCE

Please make sure you arrive at the screening **at least 30' before** the scheduled start time.



MASK USE

In all the venues hosting Festival screenings the use of a mask is **obligatory** for all audience members **in all rows** (at the entrance, the exit, the toilet, snack bar) throughout the screening.



ADMISSION TO INDOOR VENUES

At the following indoor venues: **Danaos, Ideal, Trianon and the Municipal Theatre of Piraeus** according to the health protocols in force, admission will be allowed to:

- · Those vaccinated or
- Those who have recovered (the diagnosis must have been made in the last 6 months) or
- Those who are unvaccinated and have received a negative rapid antigen test result in the last 48 hours.

To be admitted, aside from the ticket, the following will be requested:

- · a vaccination / recovery certificate or
- The negative rapid antigen test result (from the last 48 hours)
- proof of identity via ID card, passport or driving license.



Once the screening commences, no one can be admitted into the venue (even if it is during the initial commercial spot or a potential introductory session for the film).



SCREENING

There will be **no interval** during the screening. Should you wish to purchase items from the venue's snack bar please do so prior to the commencement of the screening.



SEATS

In the open-air cinemas Aegli Zappion, the Greek Film Archive Foundation, Riviera, Stella and Flery Cinema the seats are not numbered. Ushers will greet you at the entrance and lead you to your seats. In the indoor venues Danaos, Ideal, Trianon and the Municipal Theatre of Piraeus, due to the limited capacity of venues as set out by the health protocols in force, certain seats will be blocked out, indicated so with special signs by the Festival. We ask that you respect this and refrain from using these seats.



EXIT

In the event that you wish to depart during a screening, we ask that you **raise your hand to notify Festival staff**, who are present, so that they can help you leave the venue safely.



After the completion of the end credits, it is mandatory that audience members **exit the venue based on seat numbers** and as indicated by the ushers. Please **vacate the area outside the cinema** in a prompt manner.



SOCIAL DISTANCING

Please observe social distancing. This will be indicated (via stickers etc.) at every venue for your convenience.

You can purchase tickets online through **www.viva.gr**, at **physical points of sale** or by making a reservation by **calling 11876***

We urge you to purchase your tickets before arriving at the venue. Ideally, you will have the tickets printed or in electronic format on your mobile phone to ensure the safe and unobstructed entry of audience members into the venue.

PURCHASING TICKETS FROM COLLABORATING CINEMAS

Each cinema's box office can only issue tickets for screenings happening on the premises - Box offices open 60' prior to the start of the first screening and up to 30' past the start of the last screening.

PLEASE NOTE:

- Each cinema can only issue tickets for screenings happening on its premises
- One hour before and up to the start of each screening, each cinema box office will issue tickets only for same-day screenings.
- Ticket changes are NOT permitted
- Ticket cancellations are permitted online through viva.gr up until an hour before the screening start time for the film for which the original ticket was purchased
- Ticket cancellations at cinema box offices are permitted up until an hour before the screening start time. It is imperative that the ticket holder present the ticket to be cancelled at the box office of the cinema for which it was issued.
- Online ticket sales end 15' before the start of each film. In the last 15 minutes before the start of
 each film, tickets are only available from the cinema box office where the film is to be screened.

AIFF ONLINE

For viewers (medically vulnerable, caretakers or other people who work in close proximity to medically vulnerable people, etc.) who would not otherwise be able to attend screenings, the Athens International Film Festival will make a part of its programme available online via a purpose-built digital platform through which a certain number of geo-blocked screenings have been secured, adhering to all safety standards and to a high level of digital interaction.

Visit online.aiff.gr to purchase your ticket online. Following a ticket purchase and from the moment a viewer begins to stream a film they will have 24 hours to conclude the screening.

You cannot gain entry into a screening simply by showing your Film Pass. A zero-fee ticket must first be issued using the unique number on the Film Pass, either online or at one of the physical points of sale. Using your Film Pass you can issue as many tickets as you wish, even if they are for the same screening.

Film Passes cannot be used to issue tickets for films shown online through the Festival's platform (see AIFF ONLINE above).




